Pickin' & grinnin' with the O'day SOS Band

Some rOnDAYvous® attendees are more than just loyal O'dayowning sailors. Some of them — the motley crew known as the O'day Strung-Out String (SOS) Band — are as musical as they are nautical.

The annual rOnDAYvous® is a festival of good friends, good food and drink and all things O'day, but it also features the once-a-year performance (more like an annual rehearsal) by SOS, a group that can be heard nowhere else.

The SOS Band first came together spontaneously at the inaugural rOnDAYvous® in 2003 at the Harlem Yacht Club. A handful of O'day skippers who usually travel with musical instruments on board settled down in the HYC clubhouse on Saturday night, broke out their guitars (and a mandolin) and songs began pouring out. From rock and pop standards to folk chestnuts, from country favorites to Bob Marley and Jimmy Buffett, the music came together easily, and the reactions of fellow O'dayers were overwhelmingly positive.

Since then, the SOS Band has managed to show up at each of the rOnDAYvous®. At Liberty Landing Marina in 2004, the band regaled friends and passersby alike with a free-wheeling set of merry melodies. When an enormous party boat docked near the O'days and the guests from a wedding reception began to disembark, the SOS musicians were ready at the foot of the gangway, belting out a nonstop medley of familiar tunes that prompted one member of the wedding party to toss a \$20 bill in an open guitar case.

At the Raritan Yacht Club in 2006, the band, along with the entire company of rOnDAYvous® attendees, took the launch out to the mooring where Bill and Patty Coxe's O-40 Kukulcan II was waiting, then scrambled aboard to sing (and drink) the night away.

The SOS Band is built around a

core membership of sorts, with an unpredictable cast of supporting players showing up as need, whim and opportunity dictate. Mike C, skipper of the O-28 Da Capo, is the only member of the SOS Band with formal musical training, a fact that gives him no special status whatsoever within the group. Other regulars include Bill Coxe, Pete Dodenhoff of the O-322 EmmieLou, and back once again, original SOS member Rich Breeden of the O-30 Lill F.

If you come to the rOnDAYvous® and you happen to be a musical sailor, bring your instrument and/ or voice, and sit in with the group. Even if you're non-musical, you can help out the band by yelling out song suggestions, applauding at the appropriate times, and making sure the band's drinks don't run dry.

This year's performance at Newport Yacht Club & Marina will likely be dockside. Showtime is, well, whenever. Don't be late.

Although categories may vary slightly from one year to the next, some of the typically-awarded certificates include:

• Size Doesn't Matter (the smallest boat in attendance);

- Long-Distance Voyager (greatest distance traveled to the rOnDAYvous®);
- Early Bird Special (the first boat to arrive);
- Lifetime Underachievement Award (most years on the event mailing list before finally showing up);
- **Blender-Tender** (cocktail-making champ);
- Oldie But Goodie (the oldest boat at the rOnDAYvous®);

• The coveted **Rookie of the Year Award** is presented to the first-time attendee who simply has the flat-out best time at the rOnDAYvous®.

Don't think these awards are just pieces of paper, either. Scott Maat, skipper of the O-23 On Eagles' Wings, said after the 2008 rOnDAYvous®: "I framed our "Size Doesn't Matter" certificate for having the smallest boat in the fleet, and it now sits on my desk at work, prompting me to smile every time I see it."

Be prepared

What you should bring to Newport to maximize your rOnDAYvous® enjoyment

Want to get the most out of your rOnDAYvous® experience? Here's what you should bring with you.

EXTRA FENDERS AND DOCKLINES (along with snubbers or Shockles). The marina is protected by a wave-attenuating wall to cut down on turbulence from river traffic.

That, and the fact that commuter ferry traffic is greatly reduced on the weekend, should make for a lot less boat-rocking. Still, the security of extra lines and fenders shouldn't be overlooked.

CASH: There are no registration fees associated with the O'day rOnDAYvous® — never have been, and hopefully never will be. However, there are costs to be shared or pass along in staging
